Joshua Taylor, current FGS President and star of the "Genealogy Road Show," presented a, "Distinguished Service Award to Roger Moffat in recognition of exemplary and outstanding service to an FGS Member Society, the Western Michigan Genealogical Society."

Roger was honored for his many years of dedication and hard work on behalf of WMGS and the entire genealogical community. He developed and maintains the many databases available on the Society's website, www.wmgs.org, and keeps the membership list up-to-date. WMGS members who volunteer to index resources know that Roger will help them in any way that he can. Society Board members appreciate his vast knowledge of the Internet and all things related to technology. He has also chaired the Society's annual seminar, *Got Ancestors?!*, for the last six years.

Roger is also Projects Chairman for the Michigan Genealogical Council, the Genealogist for the Clan Moffat Society, and Secretary for the Family History Information Standards Organisation (FHISO). This organization works to create a digital environment where all genealogical software is more compatible, and a better GEDCOM is available to all genealogists. Roger is, "Looking forward to a standards-driven environment where things 'just work'."

wmgs.org Honored for FOURTH Year in a Row!

Family Tree Magazine announced that, “Your organization’s [WMGS] website has been named to *Family Tree Magazine’s* list of Best State Websites for Genealogy for 2014.” The award was published in the December 2014 issue and online at <http://familytreemagazine.com/article/2014-best-state-genealogy-websites>. This is the fourth consecutive year that www.wmgs.org has been recognized as one of the very best state websites for genealogical research.

The magazine notes that, “This list honors the best websites that specialize in genealogy research for one of the 50 US states. The 75 stellar sites on the list represent the go-to bookmarks for tracing American ancestors, state by state. Thank you for your work on behalf of genealogists across the USA.”

Indexes on wmgs.org have almost a quarter of million (2,489,954) records freely available to everyone. All entries have been created by dedicated volunteers who spent many, many hours deciphering handwriting or faded typed letters. *The West Michigan Newspaper Database* alone now includes over 1,000,000 records! WMGS members began indexing the obituaries in the *Grand Rapids Press* and the *Grand Rapids Herald* over forty years ago. Obituaries from 1910 through the end of 2014 are now all online. Also found in this database are Engagement, Wedding and Anniversary announcements from 1966 to the present. The *Rockford Register*, the *Holland Sentinel* and the *Northfield Advance* also have indexed records that will be found here.

The website includes vital record indexes for Kent County Marriages and Deaths. Individuals who purchased gravestones from the Black Monument Company are indexed in another database. These records cover a

larger geographical area in western and southern Michigan.

Other records indexed include: those for Kent County School Records; WWI Veterans Census; the Latzek Funeral Home; *The Farm Bureau News*; various State and Federal Censuses for west Michigan counties; and, indexes for Chapman’s *History of Kent County, Michigan* and Goss’ *History of Grand Rapids and It’s Industries*.

WMGS members have the option of putting a GEDCOM of their ancestry on wmgs.org. Many have taken advantage of this opportunity and then subsequently connected with previously unmet distant cousins or found clues to brick wall ancestors.

In 1997, our current Webmaster, Don Bryant, created the Society’s first website. Two years later, Datamaster Roger Moffat put the first database online. The number of available records has continued to increase every year. Every WMGS volunteer should be very proud of the quality and quantity of genealogical information that has been made available, for free, to the entire genealogical community.

The website also provides a wealth of information for the Society’s members. Meeting dates and times, speaker and topic descriptions, class and seminar announcements, volunteer opportunities, etc., keep members well informed.

March Membership Meeting **March 7, 2015**

The Lines that Define: the Boundaries of our State, Counties, Townships, Villages and Cities.

The various geo-political units such as states, counties, townships, villages and cities all have boundaries which influence our history and quality of life. This presentation will examine some of the origins and impacts of the many lines on maps that create a cultural and historical legacy in Michigan.

Morris O. Thomas is a Visiting Professor of Geography at Michigan State University. He has taught many classes including the Geography of United States and Canada and the Geography of Michigan. He has given many presentations for various organizations. Mr. Thomas has received numerous awards including the Distinguished Teaching Achievement Award from National Council for Geographic Education in 2008.

April Membership Meeting **April 4, 2015**

Dutch Women Immigrants to the U.S. 1880-1900

In the last two decades of the nineteenth century well over 84,000 Dutch immigrants arrived in the United States. Most headed for Western Michigan. By 1900, one-third of the Dutch-born in the United States of America lived in Grand Rapids, where they totaled 40% of the population. In 1890, nearly 300,000 residents of Dutch ancestry lived in the five-county region—Allegan, Kalamazoo, Kent, Muskegon, and Ottawa—making it the largest Dutch settlement area in the United States. Within this Dutch population were thousands of married women and single women—unmarried or widowed.

Who were these women? What was their social status in the Netherlands before immigrating? What were their occupations? Their legal rights? What motivated them to immigrate? This program takes a closer look at the distaff side of Dutch immigration. If you have a Dutch grandmother or great-grandmother in your family tree you will be interested in learning more about these women.

Janet Sjaarda Sheeres is an independent scholar and freelance author. Her books include *Son of Secession*, *Douwe J. VanderWerp*, *The Not-so Promised Land: the Dutch in Amelia County, VA 1868-1880*, and *Minutes of*

the Christian Reformed Church Assemblies 1857-1880. The last book was one she edited and annotated.

She has served as president of both the Zeeland, Michigan, Historical Society, and of the Association for the Advancement of Dutch American Studies. She was also chair of the Christian Reformed Church Historical Committee. Ms. Sheeres is the associate editor of *Origins*, the historical magazine of Calvin College's Heritage Hall Archives. Besides publishing dozens of articles in national and international historical and genealogical journals, she has taught courses on Dutch Genealogy for CALL (Calvin Academy for Life-long Learning) and given many presentations on the subject. She is currently writing about the wives of the first ten Christian Reformed Ministers — immigrant women all.

Finding European ancestors may seem to be a challenging task but this presentation covers a method that can simplify this daunting search.

The author has been successful in researching ancestors in Poland, Hungary, the Czech Republic, Slovenia and Germany. The program also gives suggestions to help those researching countries.

He has written ten genealogy books and is also a contributing editor for the *Polish American Journal*. A Polish Doctor in the Nazi Camps

March 12 @ 7:00 pm - 8:30 pm

Medical anthropologist Barbara Rylko-Bauer will discuss her book *A Polish Doctor in the Nazi Camps*. The book details her mother's experience after she was arrested in 1944 for suspicion of resistance activities. For 15 months she endured three Nazi concentration camps and a 42-day death march, spending part of the time working as a prisoner-doctor to Jewish slave laborers. Jadzia's struggle continued after the war as she attempted to rebuild her life, first as a refugee doctor in Germany and later as an immigrant to the United States. A book signing will follow the presentation.

The 2015 Writing Contest will recognize unpublished excellent genealogical writing by awarding substantial prizes. Prize winning entries and those receiving an “Honorable Mention” will be published in *Michigana*. Like all submissions to *Michigana*, entries will be thoroughly edited before publication.

Rules:

Eligibility: All family historians and genealogists, except the *Michigana* Editor and judges, are invited to submit their favorite story for the contest. There is no entry fee and membership in WMGS is not required.

Deadline: Entries will be accepted between January 1 and March 30, 2015.

Length: Stories should be between 1,500 and 3,000 words in length. Please cite your sources by using endnotes, and attach copies of documentation when appropriate. Family group sheets and pedigree charts should be included if pertinent. Neither documentation nor charts will be included in the word count.

Formats:

Entries by email are strongly preferred, but print submissions will also be accepted. When emailed, a PDF is preferred; iPages and Word documents will also be accepted. Photographs or graphics should be sent separately as 300 dpi tiff or jpeg files. **Email your submission to ruthgen@gmail.com with “*Michigana* Contest 2015” written in the Subject Line.**

If submissions are mailed, please double-space on one side of standard letter-size 8.5” x 11” paper. Put your name and a page number on each sheet. Include copies of all photographs and supporting information.

Identification: Be sure to include the story title, your name, your mailing address, phone number, and approximate word count. This information will be only used to identify and notify the winners.

Notification: The Judge’s decisions will be announced at the May 2015 WMGS Membership Meeting and in the next available issue of *Michigana*. Winners do not have to be present to win. Prize winning articles will be published in future issues of *Michigana*. By submitting articles, authors are giving WMGS one time print and digital rights. However copyright is retained by the author. Entries may not have been previously published. Judges’ comments will be provided upon request. All prizes may not be awarded.

Learn All About the 1965 Tornado

Family history is often changed by a pivotal weather event. If you lived in Michigan in 1965 your life was likely effected by the tornado that swept into the lower peninsula. Kent and Ottawa counties saw a great deal of death and destruction. If you're interested in learning more about this historical event come to Kenowa Hills Hills High School on April 11th.

In April of 1965, the Palm Sunday Tornado swept through Kent County's Alpine and Plainfield Townships. The Alpine Township Historical Commission is hosting a program on Saturday, April 11 at 7 p.m. at the Kenowa Hills High School auditorium. There is no admission fee and all are welcome.

A representative from the National Weather Service will present information about the 1965 tornado. The Commission has also produced a book and a video of witnesses and workers who remember that fateful day describing their experiences. There will also be photographic displays and the book will be available for purchase.
