

### Saturday, 10 September The Book in Each of Us


This presentation by Buck Matthews emphasizes the importance of preserving our own life stories for those who follow us. Eventually family members have been or will be faced with the task of trying to reconstruct the life journey of a beloved, a black sheep, or a brick wall ancestor. Objects, artifacts, keepsakes and old snapshots are often relatively easy to discover – but the stories that formed the fabric of their lives are lost forever unless today's family historians preserve them.

It's imperative for us to be our own researchers, our own chroniclers of the experiences and events that made us who we are. We have also lived a life worth remembering. We owe it to our descendants to leave behind the information they'll need to understand where they came from by preserving the stories of our ancestors and our own.

Part of this presentation includes the story of a mysterious little block of wood that belonged to Buck's paternal grandfather. Buck discovered it was an artifact from the 1790 founding of the nation's new Federal City. It is now in the collection of the Political History Division of the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History in Washington, DC.

Although Buck Matthews has spent more than sixty years in radio and television, he has often thought of himself as a writer who just happened to earn a living in broadcasting. An arts and community service activist, he was awarded the Key to the City by two Grand Rapids mayors and received the Grand Rapids Arts Council's Festival award in 1982. His "Buck Matthews Show" on WOODTV, Grand Rapids, aired nearly two thousand times over a nine-year period and was named the best of its kind in the nation in 1972.

His writing credits include numerous magazine, newspaper, and broadcast commentaries. *Getting Here* is his third book. His mystery novel, *Uncommon Women*,"is available as an e-book on Amazon Kindle. *Soil, Soul, and Simplicity*, is the history of Marne United Methodist Church and the village of Marne, Michigan, is available at the church.

A Maryland native and U. S. Air Force veteran, he grew up in Washington, DC, and attended Ohio Wesleyan and Columbia Universities. He and his wife, Thelma, live in Jenison, Michigan. Their son and daughter and one grandson also live in the Grand Rapids area. *And he's still writing.*

### Saturday, Oct 1st Maps, Gazetteers and Directories

Maps, Gazetteers and Directories help to put your ancestors at a specific place in a specific time period. This helps researchers know where to look for additional information and sources. Shirley Gage Hodges' presentation will show genealogists about where and how to use Maps, Gazetteers and Directories successfully in our own research.

Shirley has been actively doing genealogical research since 1967. She has taught genealogy classes and seminars – both for the novice and advanced genealogist – in the U. S. and Canada since 1994. She has also been a guest lecturer for several college-level programs. Visual aids, handouts and examples accompany her lectures.

Although she specializes in tracing your female ancestors she covers a wide variety of topics for both the novice and advanced genealogist. Her interest in sharing her love of genealogical research and her sense of humor has delighted audiences. Shirley served as President of the Genealogical Speakers Guild from 2006-2010. She is a member of the Association of Professional Genealogists, the National Genealogical Society and numerous state and local societies. She became a columnist for The Global Gazette in June 2006.

The Michigan Genealogical Council presented the 2012 Lucy Kellogg Award to Shirley Gage Hodges at the November 8, 2012 Delegate meeting in Lansing, Michigan. The Award is given annually to an outstanding genealo-

gist in the State of Michigan. She has helped index records and preserve historic sites.

#### Michigan's River Jordan Tuesday, Sept. 13, 2016, 7:00 pm

Join literary and public historian Veta Tucker Smith as she discusses her recently published work, *A Fluid Frontier: Slavery, Resistance, and the Underground Railroad in the Detroit River Borderland.* 

A long-time West Michigan educator and founder of the Kutsche Office of Local History at Grand Valley State University, Tucker will discuss the role of the Detroit River corridor in the underground railroad movement, as fugitive slaves fled the United States for Canada.

A Fluid Frontier, co-edited by Tucker and Karolyn Smardz Frost, contains essays that explore the many facets of geography and history that shaped both the region and the people who sought freedom in it. A question and answer period will follow the discussion. Copies of the book will be available for purchase and signing.

### Exploring Social Media and Email Monday, Sept. 26, 2016, 11:00 am

Connecting with new cousins and finding relatives who have family photographs or original copies of vital records is much easier today than in the past when it took days or weeks to get an answer by mail. Today genealogists have a variety of digital options. The Internet and social media have made it easier than ever before to keep in touch with friends and family. Beginning with a brief introduction to email, this class teaches how to communicate with others online and offers tips on how to be safe while doing so. You will learn the basics about Facebook, Twitter and Instagram and find out what you need to get started with Skype, Google Hangouts, and other video calling services.

### WACs, WASPs, SPARs, & Marines: Nicknames, Recruiting, and the Wartime Experience of Servicewomen from Grand Rapids

### Thursday, Nov. 10, 2016, 7:00pm

WWII was the first large-scale employment of women in the armed forces. They were first accepted by the Army, later the Navy and Coast Guard, and finally the Marine Corps. Women's struggle for acceptance is reflected in their portrayal in the media, recruitment and training, and in the nicknames they were given. This presentation will include a record of the struggle in Grand Rapids and examine how, though being the most resistant of all the forces, the Marine Corps ultimately became the most progressive branch in its acceptance of women.

The Lock-In is a free event hosted by the Grand Rap-• ids Public Library and sponsored by the Western Michigan Genealogical Society for both new and more experienced family historians. The Lock-In is held on the fourth floor Local and Family History Department. It provides an opportunity to use the extensive resources available in the stacks, share knowledge with other genealogists • and learn about new techniques and resources. Learn • how to use the microfilm reader/scanner/printer, save images, and take advantage of free copying and printing during the event. Use the time to search databases—we will have plenty of computers available or bring your own laptop and use the library's WiFi network. Bring your genealogy questions or Ancestry and Heritage Quest problems-volunteers will be on hand to assist. Network with other genealogists—you never know what you might find!

#### Lock-In Guidelines

Registration: You may ONLY register for yourself and one other person. There is a maximum of fifty people due to space limitations. If all spaces are filled there will be a waiting list. If you are registered and find you will be unable to attend, please notify the library as soon as possible so another genealogist can take your place.

**Food**: The Library and WMGS will provide snacks for hungry researchers. You may not bring food to share with others. ALL edibles MUST be eaten in the VanderVeen Room. **No** food or liquids are allowed in the stacks or by computers.

Copying: Please copy no more than TEN pages at one time. This will reduce the length of time each person has to wait for their copies to be available. To avoid confusion, it is helpful if you collect your copies as soon as they have been printed.
