Presenter: Mark Hoffman

Topic: Researching Beyond the Usual Civil War Union Sources

This session moves beyond the basic information on the service of Union veterans of the Civil War. It includes many

seldom-used sources – online, archival and printed -- which help provide context and detail to the Union Civil War experience. The presentation will include sources of information on ancestors, both men and women, soldier and civilian. It draws upon almost 40 years of experience researching Civil Warera soldiers and their families, both as a genealogist and as a Civil War historian.



Mark Hoffman currently serves as the Chief Administrative Officer for the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Previously, Hoffman was deputy director of the Michigan Department of History, Arts and Libraries for eight years after holding leadership roles with the Michigan Bureau of State Lottery and the Michigan House of Representatives. A life-long student of the American Civil War, he is the author of Among the Enemy: A Michigan Soldier's Civil War Journal (2013) and My Brave Mechanics: The First Michigan Engineers and Their Civil War (2007) – both published by Wayne State University Press. He is a graduate of Michigan State University, with a degree in History.


Presenter: Jim Jackson

Topic: The War of 1812

An overview of the causes and significant events of this war, the only war partially fought on Michigan soil. Also, how to research military, bounty land and pension records online or at local, state or national archives.

Jackson has been interested in Genealogy and Local History since the mid-70s, and served as President of the Detroit Society for Genealogical Research, Inc., the Oakland County Genealogical Society and the Cal-

houn County Genealogical Society. He has been the index editor of the DSGR Magazine since 1994, and the Past-Camp Commander for Camp #22 of the Sons of the Civil War (SUVCW) in Battle Creek, MI.



He has taught classes and presented

talks to various local and national societies, including the Great Lakes Conference, Fort Wayne, IN; the American Society of Indexers Conference in Philadelphia, PA; the Local History Conference, Macomb Community College, MI; the Ohio Genealogical Society in Cincinnati, OH; the Ontario Genealogical Society in Oshawa, Ontario; and the National Genealogical Society (NGS) Family History Conference in Grand Rapids, MI.

LADIES' LITERARY CLUB.

Mrs. Bissell Makes a Generous Offer to It In Aid of a Purchase.

The committee on science and education had charge of the program at the Ladies' Literary club meeting yesterday afternoon. A very interesting paper of "Navigation" was read, and another on the "Invention of the Compass" was equally enjoyable. The literary program was followed by a business session. It was announced that Mrs. M. R. Bissell would lend the club enough money, without interest, to purchase the lot adjoining the club property, and now owned by the St. Cecelia society, the condition of the purchase to be that the literary club would reserve twenty-five feet for itself and sell the other fifty. After a short discussion it was moved and carried that the board make an offer to the St. Cecilia club for the property.


*** Monday, March 1st, 10:00 a.m. - 11:30 a.m.: Solidarities: White Women and Women of Color's Activism to Secure the Vote opens the 12th Annual Kutsche Local History Roundtable. While the Nineteenth Amendment ostensibly provided women the right to vote, access to the ballot was not equal. Because many Black, indigenous, women of color remained disenfranchised, this presentation will place women's suffrage in conversation with the broader movement toward civil rights for Black, indigenous, people of color. Invited national scholars Liette Gidlow and Allison Lange will join Sophia Brewer and Jo Ellyn Clarey from the Greater Grand Rapids Women's History Council to explore diverse women's efforts to secure the vote.

*** Wednesday, March 17th, 10:00 a.m. - 11:30 a.m.: Lesser Known Women in West Michigan History continues the 12th

Annual Kutsche Local History Roundtable during March. Representatives of the Ionia County Historical Society, Lakeshore Museum Center, and Ada Historical Society will highlight West Michigan women whose accomplishments might not be known outside their communities. Their efforts in various industries impacted untold numbers of people and illustrate how women have leveraged their



abilities and interests to make change. This panel also reflects commitment to continuing work to preserve the stories of everyday Michiganders.

*** Wednesday, March 24th, 10:00 a.m. - 11:00 a.m.: Grand Rapids Women & Their Work During the Great War ends the 12th Annual Kutsche Local History Roundtable during March. The Greater Grand Rapids Women's History Council's Katelyn Bosch Ver-

Merris will examine both the paid labor and volunteer contributions of women in Grand Rapids during WWI. Utilizing rich primary sources, this presentation will provide a singular look at women's desires as well as their actual navigation of the war industry. Women used the upheaval of wartime to balance their work as citizens—they organized a home defense and contributed to wartime industries--but they also used the emergency to advance their personal training and implement their own goals.

*** Friday, March 26th, 10:30 am - 11:30 am: A Decade of Upheaval: Grand Rapids Women and Public Office in the 1910s will take us back to a heady decade when Grand Rapids women in increasing numbers stepped onto the public stage. Women had long participated in civic affairs and could even run for elective office before the Nineteenth Amendment took effect in 1920. But, suddenly in Michigan after November 1918, the state's women could run for anything—and they did. Grand Rapids women advanced beyond earlier races limited to school board seats and competed for City Comptroller of Grand Rapids. State Superintendent of Public Instruction, and, eventually, for national office. During the 1910s, which began in peace and prosperity but ended in war and pandemic, Grand Rapids women sophisticated their political game, claimed party affiliations, and carried their visions and concerns into public office.

*** Wednesday, March 31st, 7:00 pm: Women Who Ran! Seeking Public Office Before the Nineteenth Amendment -- Hats off to the trailblazing women of Grand Rapids! Decades before the Nineteenth Amendment granted American women the right to vote, many had led serious political lives and even run for office. In fact, before the certification of the federal amendment in 1920, 47 different Grand Rapids women had run 82 campaigns for public office between 1887 and 1920. In 1919 and 1920 alone, they ran for Grand Rapids City Commission, the Michigan State Senate, and the U.S. House of Representatives—as well as City Comptroller and State Superintendent of Public Instruction!


"Out-of-Style" by Betty Kreisel Shubert

Within every family there is likely a story of scandal, whether having documented proof or not. As genealogists, we want to scour the archives, online databases, and newspapers to find the evidence of these (sometimes) tall tales. Tell us your stories of scandals in the family - no matter how big or little.

Write it up and enter the 2021 WMGS Writing Contest.

The Western Michigan Genealogical Society has worked for over 60 years to educate researchers in evaluating and citing sources. Your story may inspire someone else to use new research techniques or discover a unique resource. The 2021 WMGS Writing Contest will recognize unpublished excellent genealogical writing by awarding substantial prizes. Prize winning entries will be published in Michigana. Like all submissions to Michigana, entries will be thoroughly edited before publication. Information about submitting any article to Michigana can also be found in the latest issue of Michigana, or at wmgs.org.

Rules for the WMGS Writing Contest

Eligibility: All family historians and genealogists, except the *Michigana* Editor and judges, are invited to submit their favorite story for the contest. There is no entry fee and membership in WMGS is not required.

Length: Stories should be between 1,500 and 3,000 words in length. Please cite your sources by using endnotes and attach copies of documentation when appropriate. Family group sheets and pedigree charts should be included if pertinent. Endnotes, documentation, photograph descriptions, and chart information will not be included in the word count.

Formats: Entry must be completed in Microsoft Word. **IMPORTANT: If you include your photographs, charts, or graphics within your document, please also send them **separately** as 300 dpi tiff or jpeg fi les.**

Identification: Include the story title, your name, mailing address, phone number, and approximate word count in the body of the email. This information will only be used to identify and notify the winners. Other than the title, this information does not need to be included within your entry.

Deadline: Entries will be accepted between January 1 & March 31, 2021. Email your submission to michigana@wmgs.org with

"WMGS Writing Contest 2021" written in the Subject Line.

Notification: Contest winners will be announced at a WMGS Membership Meeting before the end of 2021, on the WMGS Facebook Page, and in the next available issue of Michigana. Each entrant will also receive an email with the results of the WMGS Writing Contest at the time of the announcement. Winners do not

have to be present to win. Prize winning articles will be published in future issues of *Michigana*. By submitting articles, authors are giving WMGS one-time print & digital rights and are aware that submission will be edited by Michigana staff prior to printing; copyright is retained by the author. Entries may not have been previously published. All prizes may not be awarded.

Prizes:

1st prize: \$100 and 1 annual WMGS membership (total value - \$120); 2nd prize: \$75 and 1 annual WMGS membership (total value - \$95);

3rd prize: \$50; 4th prize: \$25

We take time to informally discuss questions relevant to each person's work, provide helpful, non-judgmental feedback on current or on-going writing projects, discover new research techniques, and have fun making new friends.

Genealogy is more than "names and dates." An ancestor's story or a personal memory are even more fascinating and enlightening. But some genealogists don't know how to begin, while others just need a deadline to kick start their creative juices. The Writers Group can fulfill both of these needs.

At this time the Writers Group is not having in-person meetings due to the threat of Covid 19. Many of our members are older or have compromised immune systems. Depending on how many people have access to vaccines we will then return to in-person meetings later in the summer.
