Topic: Google Services and Helps for Genealogy

Genealogy researchers often are hyper-focused on the big genealogy sites and may miss important resources on the rest of the Internet. Google can help. This presentation will include Google search engine "secrets," Google Books, Scholar, News Archive, Earth, Images, Translate, YouTube, and general computer tips. A live demonstration of Bard (Google's ChatGPT) will be featured.

Paw Paw District Library. She has degrees from Central Michigan University and the University of Michigan; over 30 years of experience locating information online; and a passionate interest in genealogy. Her family tree has many West Michigan roots and includes 26,000 people. Her extended tree



Topic: Who, what, when and where?
The Search for the Story Behind
an Iconic Suffrage Poster

Grand Rapids Public Museum holds a precious and iconic image of the women's suffrage movement, a poster given to newly-registered female voters in Grand Rapids in 1919. The poster, decorated in patriotic colors of red, white, and blue, proclaims, "A women here has registered to vote thereby assuming responsibility of citizenship." Join Ruth Stevens, a retired Grand Valley professor of Legal Studies, as she delves into the



backstory behind the poster. Who created and distributed the poster? Why 1919? Who wrote the note on it? Where was "Pantlind's Garage"? Learn about the genealogical, archival, and other sleuthing tools used to solve this local mystery and the answers revealed by them.

Ruth Stevens has a J.D. from the Univer-

sity of Michigan and a MLIS from Wayne State and is an active participant in the local history community, serving as a board member of GGRWHC, a trustee of the Grand Rapids Historical Commission, and as a presenter on diverse topics related to women's history.

Enter the 2024 WMGS Writing Contest "A Turning Point in Your Family's History"

Genealogists often discover there's one incident, event or choice that changes the family's historical trajectory. This "Turning Point" might have been a major political or military event (national, state or local), a critical meeting or a crossroad where several choices are evaluated. Perhaps disease, a birth or death, or a weather event caused a change in the family's status or required a move to a new geographical area. Please tell us about a "Turning Point" in your family's history in **1,500 to 3,000 words**.

Format: Entries must be sent as a PDF, Microsoft Word or Apple Pages Document.

Sources: WMGS strongly encourages writers to always source all facts and documents. Endnotes must be complete enough that readers could locate them easily in books, on websites, in a repository, or contact the owner of a photograph or physical item.

• Photographs and Graphics: Photographs and graphics are acceptable proofs and sources. The equivalent of a 300 dpi jpeg image is required. Please send EACH photograph, graphic or document in a SEPARATE email. Depending on the length of the article or the pertinence of the images to the story, some photos or graphics may not be included in final publication.

Length: **1,500 to 3,000 Words**. Endnotes, documentation, photograph descriptions and chart information will NOT be included in the final word count.

Eligibility: All genealogists, except the *Michigana* editors and judges, are invited to submit stories to the contest. There is no entry free and membership in WMGS is not required. Articles may not have been previously published in a newsletter, magazine or online.

Identification: On a separate cover page please include the title, your name, mailing address, email, phone number and approximate word count. This information will only be used to identify and notify winners. Also include a brief paragraph about yourself and your genealogical interests that is typically found in the "About the Author" comment at the end of published articles in *Michigana*. The Judges will not see this information until after judging is completed.

Deadline: Entries will be accepted between January 1 and March 31, 2024. Email your submission to michigana@wmgs.org with "WMGS Writing Contest 2024" in the subject line. You may only submit ONE entry to this contest

Notification: Contest winners will be announced at the May 2024 WMGS membership meeting. Each entrant will also receive an email with the results of the WMGS Writing Contest at the time of the announcement. Winners do not have to be present to win. Prize winning articles will be published in future issues of *Michigana*. By submitting articles, authors give WMGS one-time print and digital rights. Copyright is retained by the author. All submissions will be edited by *Michigana* staff prior to printing.

Prizes: 1st prize: \$100 and one annual WMGS membership (total value - \$120); 2nd prize: \$75 and one annual WMGS membership (total value - \$95); 3rd prize, \$50; 4th prize, \$25. All prizes may not be awarded.

Volunteer Opportunities

West Michigan Genealogical Society has many different opportunities to volunteer. Several of our projects need to be done at the downtown branch of the Grand Rapids Public Library, these are; School Census Card Indexing, Robinson Portrait Card Collection indexing, Obituary lookups, and Genealogy Help.

Manuscripts can be done from the comfort of your own home. We will send you a PDF copy of a manuscript and you will index the names and information from the copy into an excel file and then email it back.

We are also looking for a person to work with the refreshment hostess in setting up snacks for the meetings. We are always looking for people to provide snacks too.

Volunteer opportunities are listed below with a brief description:

- Manuscripts; Manuscripts are "unpublished papers" that have been given to WMGS. We scan the original document then a copy of the document is used to extract names from it and put in a spreadsheet. Manuscripts can be emailed to you with instructions so you can do at your own home When you complete the index you email the index spreadsheet back to the project manager.
- School Census Cards; School Census Cards are cards filled out by the local schools of their students. These cards are in boxes with multiple names on the card. The names are indexed, along with the parent's name and other pertinent information. The cards are part of the GRPL collection and can't leave the fourth floor of the downtown library. This project has to be done at the library, on the fourth floor.
- Robinson Portrait Cards Collection; The cards are the "paper trail" of the orders for all the portraits taken by Robinson studio over many years. We index each card in the box so that at some point people will be able to search the index and get a copy of the actual portrait. This project has to be done at the library, on the fourth floor.
- Obituary Lookup: A group of volunteers meet at the downtown library and look up obituaries that have been requested of WMGS. This is done on the fourth floor of the library.
- Genealogy Help: WMGS and GRPL help individuals start their family trees and to help them solve brick walls that are causing a problem. This group meets on Thursday's at GRPL fourth floor.
- Refreshments; Volunteers provide refreshments (cookies and snacks) at the general meeting once or twice a year.




History Detectives Grand Rapids announces the return of its popular day-long local history programming event and aims to bring together those interested in the evolution and history of local topics and persons.

During World War II a banner with a gold star was presented to the families of the fallen. *Stories Behind the Stars* initiative was created to organize one central digital location to collect the stories of the 421,000+ Americans who were killed during World War II. These stories will be



digitally linked to all war memorials and cemeteries by a smartphone app so visitors can read the stories of the fallen. This national effort, researched, written, and financially supported by all those who want to see the fallen remembered, will ensure that future generations will be able to learn about each of the Americans who paid the price for the freedoms we take for granted every day.
