Given the near-total loss of the 1890 U.S. Census, state census records frequently serve as an effective substitute. This program will explore these underutilized resources, focusing primarily on the available schedules from across the United

States from that time period.

A Senior Archivist at the Archives of Michigan, Kris has worked in the genealogical community for more than 20 years. He is a former Vice President of Membership for the Federation of Genealogical Societies and a Past-President of the Mid-Michigan Genealogical Society.

Saturday, April 6, 1:30 p.m. Presenter: Bruce Butgereit

Topic: Post Traumatic Stress Disorder in the Civil War

Bruce is recognized for his research ability in a wide variety of subjects that include the Civil War, post-Civil War patriotic and fraternal organizations, Kent County war memorials, Abraham Lincoln, and the Lincoln Highway. This research has been shared over the past 40 years through living history presentations, written articles (magazines, newspapers, newsletters, and historical journals), and other programming. Bruce is the recipient of numerous awards and recognition for his work.

Since 2000, he has led the efforts to restore over fifteen Civil War memorials in Michigan and elsewhere and helped dedicate a number of new memorials. He serves as Executive Director of History Remembered, Inc., an organization that advocates for historic preservation and restoration through educational outreach and consultation. His most recent projects include identifying veterans (known and unknown) on a

memorial cross in Crystal Springs Cemetery in Benton Harbor and serving as the historian of the (1900) Grand Army of the Republic Building in Detroit.

His program titled, Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder in the Civil War, will look at the earliest diagnosis of PTSD and the various



names applied to the condition. Included will be several real-life cases involving veterans of the war living at the Michigan Soldiers' Home.

Topic: Michigan Roots: African American Migration in Michigan

Rozlyn Kelly is an attorney with over 20 years of genealogical research experience focused on African American ancestry in Michigan, Canada, Southern Illinois, Kentucky, and Washington, D.C. She is currently President of the Farmington Genealogical Society and serves on the executive



board of the Michigan Genealogical Council as Past President.

Michigan Roots: African American Migration in Michigan. The presentation discusses the migration of Blacks to Michigan in the mid-1880s, before the Great Migration from the south, with specific examples in Marquette, Midland, and Detroit.

Enter the 2024 WMGS Writing Contest "A Turning Point in Your Family's History"

Genealogists often discover there's one incident, event or choice that changes the family's historical trajectory. This "Turning Point" might have been a major political or military event (national, state or local), a critical meeting or a crossroad where several choices are evaluated. Perhaps disease, a birth or death, or a weather event caused a change in the family's status or required a move to a new geographical area. Please tell us about a "Turning Point" in your family's history in **1,500 to 3,000 words**.

Format: Entries must be sent as a PDF, Microsoft Word or Apple Pages Document.

Sources: WMGS strongly encourages writers to always source all facts and documents. Endnotes must be complete enough that readers could locate them easily in books, on websites, in a repository, or contact the owner of a photograph or physical item.

• Photographs and Graphics: Photographs and graphics are acceptable proofs and sources. The equivalent of a 300 dpi jpeg image is required. Please send EACH photograph, graphic or document in a SEPARATE email. Depending on the length of the article or the pertinence of the images to the story, some photos or graphics may not be included in final publication.

Length: **1,500 to 3,000 Words**. Endnotes, documentation, photograph descriptions and chart information will NOT be included in the final word count.

Eligibility: All genealogists, except the *Michigana* editors and judges, are invited to submit stories to the contest. There is no entry free and membership in WMGS is not required. Articles may not have been previously published in a newsletter, magazine or online.

Identification: On a separate cover page please include the title, your name, mailing address, email, phone number and approximate word count. This information will only be used to identify and notify winners. Also include a brief paragraph about yourself and your genealogical interests that is typically found in the "About the Author" comment at the end of published articles in *Michigana*. The Judges will not see this information until after judging is completed.

Deadline: Entries will be accepted between January 1 and March 31, 2024. Email your submission to **michigana@wmgs.org** with "WMGS Writing Contest 2024" in the subject line. You may only submit ONE entry to this contest

Notification: Contest winners will be announced at the May 2024 WMGS membership meeting. Each entrant will also receive an email with the results of the WMGS Writing Contest at the time of the announcement. Winners do not have to be present to win. Prize winning articles will be published in future issues of *Michigana*. By submitting articles, authors give WMGS one-time print and digital rights. Copyright is retained by the author. All submissions will be edited by *Michigana* staff prior to printing.

Prizes: 1st prize: \$100 and one annual WMGS membership (total value - \$120); 2nd prize: \$75 and one annual WMGS membership (total value - \$95); 3rd prize, \$50; 4th prize, \$25. All prizes may not be awarded.

May—What was your favorite toy? Did you have toys that were handed down from one generation to the next? Tell us your "Toy Story."


And as always, people are welcome to write on suggested topics or bring in a project they are working on for suggestions.
